

Bramshott and Liphook Neighbourhood Development Plan 2020 to 2040

Equalities Impact Assessment

Prepared by the Neighbourhood Development Plan Steering Group on behalf of Bramshott and Liphook Parish Council



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1. Introduction

- 1.1. The Equalities Act places a duty on public authorities, in the exercise of their functions, to have regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, to advance equality of opportunity and to foster good relations between persons who have a 'protected characteristic' and those who do not.
- 1.2. There are nine 'protected characteristics', which are:
 - age
 - disability
 - gender reassignment
 - marriage and civil partnership
 - pregnancy and maternity
 - race
 - religion or belief
 - sex
 - sexual orientation
- 1.3. It is important to consider, when writing planning policies, how those policies might impact those with protected characteristics. This will help to ensure that the policies are carefully thought through, with a view to increasing participation and inclusion, changing the culture of public decision-making, and placing a more proactive approach to the promotion of equality and fairness at the heart of public policy.
- 1.4. An Equalities Impact Assessment (EqIA) is tool used to systematically assess a policy or policies, to explore whether there might be an adverse impact on a one or more of the groups with protected characteristics. It is a method of assessing and recording the likely differential and/or adverse impact of a policy on people from the different groups. This helps to identify any unintended consequences that a policy might have. If a policy is found to result in unfairness or discrimination, then changes to eliminate or lessen the impact should be considered.
- 1.5. This document presents the EqIA that has been prepared to accompany the Submission version of the Bramshott and Liphook Neighbourhood Development Plan (the BLNDP). It presents the baseline data on the parish and then assesses the objectives and policies of the BLNDP to ensure that Bramshott and Liphook Parish Council (as the qualifying body responsible for preparing the BLNDP) is satisfying its statutory duties in this regard.

2. Baseline data

2.1. In preparing the EqIA, 2021 Census data has been examined to compile a brief profile of each equality grouping. Data for the Parish is available for the following protected characteristics: age, disability, race, religious belief, sex, and, in part, sexual orientation. Data relating to gender reassignment and pregnancy/maternity is unavailable at Parish level. Parish level data has been compared to data for East Hampshire and England.

Age profile

2.2. In 2021 the population of Bramshott and Liphook (B&L) Parish was 9,776 people. The following table indicates that the age profiles of those living in the Parish largely mirror those of the District and England as a whole. There was a very slightly higher than average number of children and teenagers living the Parish at the time of census, when compared to broader district.

Gender

2.3. The figures mirror those of the wider population. Other gender categories are not available at the parish level at this time.

Disability

2.4. The number of residents with a disability that limits activity is lower in the Parish than across the district and country.

Race

2.5. The majority of residents in the Parish identify themselves as white, mirroring the district figure. Other ethnicities are significantly lower than across the country as a whole.

Religion or belief

2.6. The dominant faith group across England as a whole is Christian. 1.36% of the population of the Parish follow a different religion, compared to the 10.99% across the country. Approximately 40% of those living in the Parish do not have a religion.

Sexual orientation

2.7. Data from the 2021 census at the parish or ward levels relating to the sexual orientation of the population is not yet available. Data for the district and the country is shown below.

In summary

- 2.9. In summary, Bramshott and Liphook Parish has a:
 - slightly higher percentage of children and teenagers than at the district level;
 - slightly higher percentage of older people, aged 65+, than nationally, but in line with the district;

- similar percentage of males and females;
- lower percentage of the population with a health problem or disability that has lasted, or was expected to last, at least 12 months and limits daily activity either a lot or a little;
- significantly lower proportion of non-white persons;
- significantly lower percentage of people who follow a religion other than Christianity; and
- a slightly higher percentage of the population are living in a household as part of a same-sex partnership than at the district level.

3. Community involvement

- 3.1. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), which sets out Government planning policy, states that the planning system should play an important role in facilitating social interaction and creating inclusive communities. It highlights the need to create a shared vision with communities of the residential environment and facilities they wish to see. This should be through the involvement of all sections of the community in the development of plans and the need to plan for a mix of housing to meet the needs of different groups in the community (such as, but not limited to, families with children, older people, people with disabilities, service families and people wishing to build their own homes).
- 3.2. Throughout the plan preparation process, the Neighbourhood Development Plan Steering Group has sought to ensure that residents, their representatives, local businesses, interest groups and wider interested parties, including statutory and regulatory bodies, have been actively consulted and their views sought. The overarching principles of the stakeholder engagement process has been to engage in a manner that is extensive, effective, inclusive, fair, transparent, and proportionate.
- 3.3. A full description of the community involvement is contained in the Consultation Statement which accompanies the Submission Plan. In summary:
 - All written communications were in English, and it was not considered necessary to translate them into any other language.
 - Agendas, key reports, and updates have been regularly provided online on the Neighbourhood Plan website.
 - A series of events and workshops on various topics relating to the BLNDP have taken
 place throughout the process, including a visioning event, development exhibitions and
 themed workshops.
 - A questionnaire was delivered to all households.
 - A Housing Needs Survey was undertaken to understand local housing needs.
 - Design guidance work was commissioned for the Parish.
 - Meetings with developers have taken place.
 - Screening for SEA / HRA purposes was undertaken by East Hants District Council, including consultation with the statutory consultees.
- 3.4. Other means of communication for sharing information on the BLNDP have included the use of noticeboards around the parish, displays, presentations and Q&A sessions at local meetings, articles and updates published in local newsletters.
- 3.5. Consideration has been given to all comments and responses made in the preparation of the BLNDP. In particular, the responses to the visioning event and survey in the early stages of the plan-making process were used to shape the vision and ambitions for the BLNDP.

4. Likely impact on groups with protected characteristics

4.1. In consultation with the community, a vision and ambitions for the Parish to 2040 were developed and agreed:



- Sustainable development and housing: There are well designed affordable community
 focused homes of the right size and tenure. They allow growth and adaptation to serve all
 phases of life, promoting health & wellbeing. The architecture uses passive energy and low
 carbon building materials and there is increased biodiversity and reduced carbon emissions
 for existing and proposed development.
- **Biodiverse environment and green spaces:** Natural environments, open spaces, biodiversity and wildlife are restored, enhanced, protected and accessible for all, where appropriate. There is a network of ecological corridors that connect through the villages and to the wider countryside. Space for a wide range of active and passive recreation, for all ages. Air & water quality is good, it is quieter with dark skies and tranquillity.
- Safe and active travel: A place where walking and cycling are the first choice for local journeys. There is the infrastructure to support electric cars with fewer miles travelled by vehicle. Safe routes to access amenities and the station. Welcoming streets where people connect on their journey.
- **Preserved heritage:** The parish's unique historic buildings are protected and enhanced. They are appreciated alongside contemporary architecture as part of our daily activities.
- Connected and supported communities: There are facilities for all needs for health, social and wellbeing, local food produce, education, culture, retail, sport and recreation. They are inclusive spaces that connect and bring people together linked to active travel and green spaces, carparking and electric vehicle charging.
- Enhanced & circular local economy: Established local businesses are doing well and new
 businesses emerging. There is an increase in tourism and with more people working closer
 to or at home, using the local facilities and networks. The local economy is circular and
 thriving.

- 4.2. The vision is expected to have a positive likely impact on those with protected characteristics. It recognises and supports access for the whole community to local social, employment, leisure, and environmental amenities. It also supports improvements to housing choice and provision and sustainable transport options.
- 4.3. The six ambitions that set out how the Parish Council proposes to deliver its vision for the Parish to 2040. Delivery of the objectives will be through a combination of planning policies, projects, and community actions. *Table 1* reviews each ambition to assess its likely impact on groups with protected characteristics within the Parish:

This will have a positive impact on a number of those with protected characteristics in addition to the wider population. For instance, the policy will help to tackle social isolation.

- 4.4. All the BLNDP ambitions are considered to have either a positive or neutral likely impact on those with protected characteristics.
- 4.5. Table 2 lists the policies of the Submission version BLNDP. It identifies the outcomes that the successful application of the policies are expected to achieve and assesses the potential for the policies of the Plan to have an impact on each of the equality target groups with protected characteristics. There are no individual policies that are considered likely to have a negative impact.

5. Conclusion

- 5.2. In preparing the BLNDP, Bramshott and Liphook Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group have sought to engage widely with the local community. They have gone beyond minimum consultation requirements to gather the views of the community.
- 5.3. In conclusion, the assessment finds the BLNDP to be appropriate and that the duty of care prescribed by the Equalities Act (2010) is met.
